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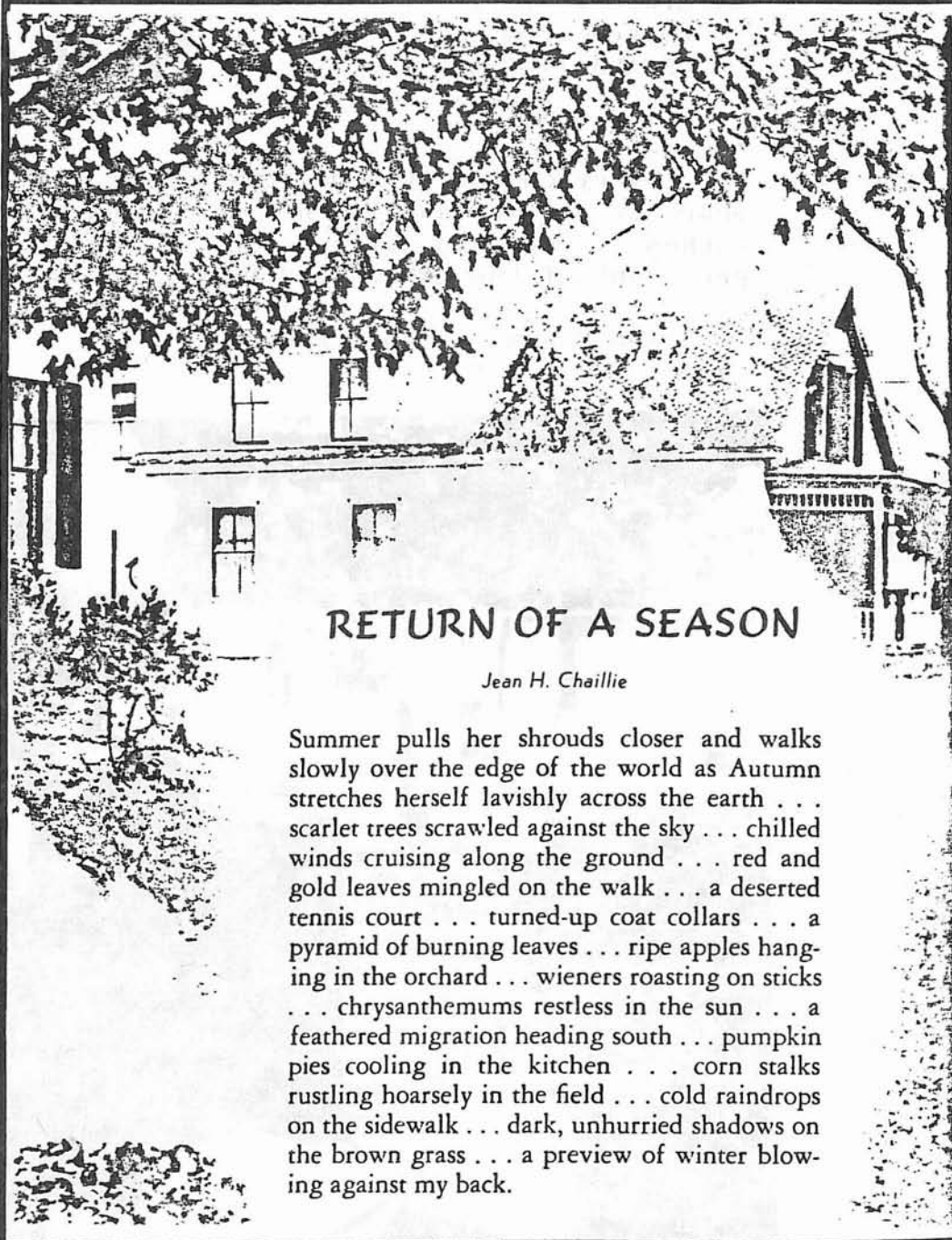
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RETURN OF A SEASON

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A tale of Dunbar Hill

Refugees may have left

Every community along the rim of the Great Lakes has its share of stories and legends of sunken treasure and buried caches of gold and silver coins, according to Earl Hann, past president of the Oshawa and District Historical Society.

And Oshawa is no different.



ONE OF the more circulated stories according to Earl Hann, has it that pots of old coins may have been buried in the vicinity of Dunbar's

Hill, near the Port of Oshawa Pioneer Cemetery. Rumors suggest the money could have been squirreled away by Americans who

were afraid to keep their money in banks during the Civil War or counterfeiters who operated in the area. Hann said when

the cemetery was moved to its present site a few years ago construction activity failed to turn up even one coin.

Hann said many of the stories of buried money he has heard over the years are just that - stories. But a few, he concedes, could be true.

Take the story of buried coins on Dunbar Hill, for example, he said.

In 1878 stories have it, an American visitor to Oshawa nosing around the waterfront dug up a pot or kettle of coins on Dunbar Hill, in the vicinity of the port of Oshawa Pioneer Cemetery.

Residents in the area beleived the money belonged to American Civil War refugees who buried the coins there for the duration of the unrest.

Hann said with the war at an end and the United States beginning to recover, the Americans were withdrawing their money from the improvised bank.

Oshawa's wooded lakeshore was also known in the early 1800's as the home away from home for American counterfeiters.

An Oshawasettler, Thomas Conant in his book of LIFE IN CANADA tells how New England counterfeiters came over after the War of 1812 to set up their mints in the dense woods of Lower Canada.

The Americans specialized in milling fake Spanish and Mexican coins, a common currency of the day, he said.

Conant said that the counterfeiters melted the silver coins down, and mixed them with lead. The counterfeit coins were milled so carefully that one Montreal bank accepted \$4,000 of the 'queer stuff.'

Conant said American paymasters used to cross Lake Ontario on a regular basis to buy counterfeit dollars and exchange them for real coins.

Hann said references to certain incidents in old documents led him to beleive events happened which could lead to buried money.

After all Oshawa's history was'nt that dull," he pointed out.

Residents are always digging up artifacts over a century old, Hann pointed out. "Why not money then," he asked.

The Robinson House Museum, he said has two or three old cannon balls which were recovered from the Second Marsh where the story goes that another sloop sought refuge from American war ships.

Bob Stephenson, an amateur archaeologist specializing in sunken ships, agrees with Hann that every community along the lake has its share of stories.

"I think a lot of them are perpetuated by people who like to romanticize," Stephenson said.

In the years Stephenson has spent searching and finding old wrecks in Lake Ontario, the most the diver has found was ship fittings.

One story Stephenson likes to tell involves the strong-box of money lost on shore just west of Darlington Provincial Park by French fur traders.

Late in the 1700's he said a French sloop was sent to provision and pick up money from an illegal fur-trading post in the Darlington Park area.

A British sloop waiting further east for the French vessel forced it to go aground. The crew rowed ashore from the ship carrying their strong-box.

Stephenson said when the men were rounded up by the British troops ashore days later the strong-box was missing.

That rumor, he said was passed from generation to generation by one of the families with property on the lake.

You can accept it or not, he said.



THE MOST EARL HANN has come across buried in Oshawa are two old cannon balls and a flintlock pistol. The past president of the Oshawa and District Historical Society hastened to add that it didn't mean something more valuable such as money could have been buried in the area. Old stories and rumors of buried wealth always circulate in small communities, he said — more so if the community is located along the shores of the Great Lakes.

Hostage-Inspired Gimmicks Shunned by Their Relatives

The International Gold Bullion Exchange a gold and silver broker took ads in several major U.S. newspapers in October, offering to sell a silver coin commemorating the Iranian hostage crisis.

The company, which is running the nationwide campaign from a swank branch office opened in Los Angeles in the early part of October, promises consumers that \$5 of the \$32 price of the coin will be placed in a special trust fund to be distributed eventually among the American hostages and their families.

Officials of the International Gold Bullion Exchange, which has been in operation less than a year, admit that they are out to make money and a name for the fledgling firm. They also proclaim a goal of raising nearly \$1 million for each hostage through the coin sales.

However, it appears that no representative of the company ever contacted any of the relatives of the hostages about the idea.

IN THE YEAR SINCE the hostages were seized, other American entrepreneurs have attempted to hawk everything from "Let Our People Go" T-shirts to anti-Khomeini toilet paper.

A few of the promotional schemes have included promises to turn a portion of the proceeds over to the hostages families, but there is no indication that such financial aid ever has been sought or received by the relatives.

Indeed Many of the relatives resent it.

"It's tacky," said Dorothea Morefield, wife of hostage Richard Morefield. "It's people making money at our expense."

While acknowledging that many of the operations are legitimate and some are well-meaning, family representatives said the promotions were unwanted and ill-conceived.

"The FLAG (Family Liaison Action Group) lawyers are following every one of these up and forcing them out of business," Mrs Morefield explained, referring to an organization of the hostages families.

"Apparently, if they actually put that money into some type of fund, we can't make them stop saying that the money is for the hostages. But we do our best to rattle sabres. None of these things have any backing of FLAG or of the families."

MEMBERS OF FLAG formally agreed earlier this year not to endorse anything.

That decision was triggered by a series of incidents, including one in which a car dealer in the Washington area offered to give FLAG \$300 for each new car he sold if relatives of the hostages would pose for pictures handing the keys to car buyers.

The list of hostage-inspired promotions is a long one, including bracelets engraved with inscriptions such as "I take a stand for the hostages in Iran," dart boards bearing the face of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, toilet paper with various anti-Khomeini slogans printed on each sheet, and a spin-the-dial game in which the fate of the hostages is "determined" by where the needle stops.

Annoyed by attempts to market such items, the relatives especially are irked when the sales pitch includes a claim that some of the proceeds will benefit the hostages.

KATHARINE KEOGH, president of FLAG, said she receives at least one report a week of some such promotion. In the most flagrant example. Keogh said, a North Carolina woman sold thousands of hostage T-shirts in bulk to companies with the claim that all the money would go to the hostages.

Keogh said the woman, who also at one time put out a hostage news letter and ran a "Center for Hostage Release," netted at least \$24,000 from the scheme before she closed it when FLAG and authorities threatened a lawsuit and possible criminal action.

Other promotions claiming to raise money for the hostages have included someone selling ash from Mount St. Helens, offers of hostage bracelets and a plaster of paris statue of Khomeini, which, according to the ads, would enable a purchaser to "Hold the Ayatollah hostage."

BENEFITS, SUPPOSEDLY for the hostages, were held last spring in bars in three rural Arizona towns before complaints from Mary Lopez, the mother of hostage James Lopez, and a local newspaper investigation stopped them.

A "They were using not just my son but the hostages as a whole as a come-on," Mrs Lopez said in a interview from her home in Globe, Arizona. "It made me very angry that someone was trying to make money on my son's situation."

No money from the promotions was ever given to Mrs Lopez or to any other hostage family.

A NEW WRINKLE IN the hostage exploitation game has cropped up in recent days as speculation has increased that the hostages may be released soon, according to FLAG President Keough.

Keough said that at least 20 families have received offers from various news organizations for all-expense paid trips to Germany in exchange for exclusive stories on their ordeals. Government plans call for flying the hostages to a medical hospital in Germany upon their release.

"It is again a commercial aspect of one's human suffering," she complained.

As with the others, the coin-sale promotion is being conducted without the consent or endorsement of the hostage families.

WILLIAM ALDERDICE, president of the Internation Gold Bullion Exchange, which began marketing the coin October 26th; with ads in papers in Los Angeles, Atlanta, New York, Dallas and Kansas City, insisted that his promotion was not exploitation.

Alderdice, stated in his office in Los Angeles, that the coin sales were designed not just to benefit the hostages, but also to provide purchasers with something that would grow in value as the price of silver increased and leave them with a memento of an important moment in U.S. history.

He also contended that safeguards would guarantee that the hostages or their relatives would receive the full \$5 per coin promised by the firm.

Asked whether the company had contacted any hostage families about the scheme, Alderdice said he had delegated the task to Ralph Greer, a Los Angeles attorney hired on third week of October to work on the coin promotion. However, Greer said he had never contacted any of the families nor was he supposed to.

My role in this is strictly to make sure that this thing is absolutely clean and legal," Greer said. "The Marketing aspects of it, the other aspects of it, the promotional aspects of it - I have nothing to do with that.

Alderdice's brother, Jim, Vice President insisted that the company plans to contact the families of the hostages.

"That is in the process of being done right now," he said. "We're having somebody do that." Alderdice, however, was'tnt sure who would call the family members.

IN THE ADS, WHICH include toll-free telephone numbers and advise that the purchase can be charged on credit cards, the Bullion Exchange offers a commemorative coin weighing one troy ounce and made of .999 fine silver. A sketch of the coin, which William Alderdice said had yet to be minted, showed a picture of a blindfolded hostage in front of a map of Iran on one side, and pictures of Khomeini and the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi on the other side.

The ad carried the slogan "America, let them know they are not forgotten," and a price tag of \$30 per coin, plus a \$2 shipping and handling fee.

Raw silver is selling for about \$19 a troy ounce, according to Gerhard Stadler, head of the precious metals division of the First National Bank of Chicago.

William Alderdice contended that it would cost about \$1 apiece to mint each coin and as much as \$3 each for marketing and overhead costs, an estimate, which, if correct, would leave a \$2 per-coin profit.

His projections differ from those of his brother who said the company is not likely to make any money at all.

"We'll be lucky to cover our advertising costs on this," Jim Alderdice said. "We're not out to make a profit."
