Gold coin celebrates our national anthem

Canada's 1981 commemorative gold and silver coins will mark the adoption of O Canada as the national anthem, and the 100th anniversary of the start of the transcontinental Canadian Pacific Railway.

The \$100 gold coin, to be issued next fall, has been selected to mark the approval of O Canada by Parliament as the country's official national anthem on July 1, 1980.

The reverse of the coin will depict a musical scroll with the first four notes of the national anthem, superimposed on a map of Canada. The words O Canada will appear below the design, which is the work of Nova Scotia artist Roger Savage. No stranger to coin design, Savage created the 1978 Unity gold coin which depicted the graceful flight of 12 Canada geese.

The coin, with the effigy of Queen Elizabeth on the obverse, will contain one-half ounce of gold, and will have a diameter of 27 mm. The coin, with an authorized mintage of 250,000, will be available from Sept. 1 to Nov. 30, 1981.

The commemorative silver dollar coin will depict an early steam locomotive traversing the Canadian map. The legend will read 1981 Dollar/Canada.

The design on the reverse is the work of Nova Scotia artist Christopher Gorey. The diameter of the silver dollar remains at 36 mm., and the fineness at .500. It will be available the first week in March, and will be on sale until the end of October, 1981.

No prices have been released, but a mint official hinted that the drop in silver bullion prices in the last year or so would mean a lowering of the dollar's price. The mint received many complaints about the \$22 price for last year's silver dollar, and demand dropped.

The designs for these two commemoratives were approved by the federal cabinet following the recommendation of a selection committee consisting of art experts, artists and numismatists. More than 60 drawings were submitted during a national competition sponsored by the mint.

The coin designs were unveiled in Ottawa in the latter part of January, 1981, by Supply and Services Minister Jean-Jacques Blais. He revealed that the mint has struck more than 1,762,000 \$100 gold coins since 1976, and 2,215,000 one ounce Maple Leaf gold coins since Sept. 1979.

The sale of these gold coins yielded approximately \$1.6 billion, of which 80 per cent came from foreign sales.

Blais expressed the hope that the gold coin programs will be continued, and said he is in favor of amendments to the Currency and Exchange Fund Act to permit "further minting of gold coins.

Hobby observers interpret this to mean an extension of the Maple Leaf program beyond the present expiry at the end of 1981, and its expansion to include fractional Maple Leaf coins.

11. Wooden Money... All wooden money from Canada, U.S.A. and Foreign.

12. Best O.N.A. Club Member Display... Includes all above categories, O.N.A. club members in good standing 6 months prior to the show date, only can participate in this category. Material must be from Club Archives or Library or material loaned to the O.N.A. Club.
13. Best of Show... All categories listed above will constitute one category to ascertain the identity of the highest point scoring displays in the entire exhibition .
14. Non-Competition Exhibits... Open to all Collectors, Banks, Dealers and Manufacturing. No award is given in this category.

Awards and Ribbons will be awarded according with Display Rules.

The Display Categories will judge by O.N.A. appointed Judges, and judged according to the O.N.A. Point System.

The "CHAS. B. LAISTER TROPHY" donated to the Ontario Numismatic Association for Annual Competition of O.N.A. Member Club Displays.

This trophy will be up for competition at the 19th Annual O.N.A. Convention, hosted by the Niagara Falls Coin Club, April 24-25-26, 1981, at The Skylon Tower.

The trophy will be awarded for the best display from any O.N.A. Member Club in Ontario that is in good standing at Convention time. The display can be put in as a club project, or by a member of an Ontario Club but only in the name of the Club he or she is a member of.

Only one display will be allowed from each member club. The space or area allowed will be that of one, two or three display cases. The category will be of any category that the club wish to put in. But all displays in this competition will be competitive and none of these displays will be allowed to compete in any other O.N.A. categories.



EXHIBIT RULES

1. Security will be provided during the three day convention.
2. Competition for exhibitors is open to all members of the Ontario Numismatic Association or any Recognized coin club.
3. Display material must be the property of the person displaying same.
4. The name or identity of any exhibitor in competition shall not appear on the exhibit unless non-competitive or club display.
5. Exhibitors are asked not to attend their exhibits while the displays are being judge. (Exhibitor can be disqualified if he or she does not abide with this rule.)
6. All matters relating to the display at this show shall be determined by the Exhibit Chairman.
7. Exhibitors are responsible for setting up display and removing same.
8. The judge will submit final point scores for all competitive displays to the Exhibit Chairman at the close of the judging. The selection of the prize winning exhibits is the responsibility of the judges and their decision is final.
9. Cases supplied are the standard exhibit size.
10. No vertical frames or cases exhibits allowed. All cases must lie flat on exhibitor tables.
11. No moving or animated displays for competition allowed.
12. No material of any kind allowed outside case.
13. Exhibit, in order to qualify, must be placed between 9:00 A.M. & 6:00 P.M. Friday April 24th 1981 or between 8:30 A.M. to Noon Saturday, April 25th 1981. Your display must be left intact until 4:00 P.M. on Sunday, April 26th: 1981.
14. No advertising in any form will be permitted with any competitive exhibit.
15. Any material known to be a legitimate copy or replica, must be labelled. Any material known to be forged, spurious or counterfeit cannot be displayed unless the exhibit is labelled and titled as an exhibit of forgeries and displayed non-competitively for educational purposes only.
16. Display awards will be presented to the winners at the Banquet on Saturday Evening.
17. Judging will take place around 2:00 P.M. on Saturday, April 25th; 1981.

18. No one may enter more than one exhibit in any one category.
19. All exhibits shall be shown at the owner's risk and neither the Ontario Numismatic Association, the Niagara Falls Coin Club, The Skylon Tower, or Convention Committee shall be liable in the event of loss or damage to any exhibit.
