Cripple of the Old West

When James E. Fraser designed the Indian head or buffalo nickel for production starting in 1913, he developed one of the most distinctive and avocative of American coins. His classic Indian head, modeled after three different subjects, and his powerful bison or buffalo reverse comprised a sagebrush scented metallic portrait of the Old West. And in his buffalo Fraser produced a design which would be the victim of one of America's most celebrated mint errors. It would lose a leg in Denver.

The 1937 three-legged buffalo nickel struck in Denver is among the rare coins of latter-day American mintage. While the number struck is unknown, it must have been comparatively small. The broken or clogged die that eliminated the buffalo's right foreleg probably was destroyed after the error was discovered; strangely enough, it not only was clogged but it had many design features different from the accurate die used for the four legged coin. They are as follows:

1. The entire buffalo on the three-legger is slightly smaller than on any other nickel in the series 1913-38.
2. The "E Pluribus Unum" is smaller.
3. The bottoms of the initial letters P and U in Pluribus Unum are well clear of the buffalo's back; on other buffalo nickel's they almost touch.

4. The beard is narrower than on four-legged buffalos. Its tip ends are sharp pointed and the right one hangs lower than the left; on all other buffalos the tips are more blunt and nearly even in length.
5. The area of hair in front of the animal's lower shoulder is narrower than on the others.
6. The hoof below the missing leg is a weak strike; on the others it is well struck.
7. The line of the underbody is quite even as it joins the front leg; on the others a narrow sunken area appears.
8. On the three-leggers a series of lumps in the metal forms an arc in the area between the upper hind and lower front legs; this doesn't appear on the others.
9. The tip below the belly is relatively long and narrow, slants back toward the hind legs and appears to have a ball end; on the other buffalos the tip is much shorter, wider and squared at the end.
10. The hind legs are well formed and proportioned except that they're not fully rounded, which gives them a somewhat motheaten appearance; on the others the legs are fully rounded, thicket and more stocky.



The Monkey Coins of Ceylon

Separated from India by the 30 mile wide Palk strait, the large island of Ceylon has had a culture of its own from ancient times. One manifestation of this culture is a longtime record of artistic coinage.

During the 10th century a powerful empire embraced the entire island, and from time to time even portions of the Indian mainland were ruled by the Singhalese emperors of Ceylon. Until the 15th century, when the empire declined, the coinage consisted of bronze and gold massu. Strangely enough, there were very few silver coins. The massu were the size and thickness of Roman gold aurei, whence they took their appearance originally, for Roman gold coins were much used in medieval India.

One one side the coin showed the emperor standing, wearing crown and mantle and holding a kind of orb. The reverse usually depicted the monkey-shaped god Hanuman, who is part of the Indian Buddhist pantheon. Inscription were in Hindu characters but Singhalese language. The coins were well struck and showed craftsmanship. Today the bronze massu is rather common and brings

two or three dollars. The gold massu is rare and desirable.

The monkey coins of Ceylon were so popular at one time that other countries imitated them, but they lacked the skilled mint workers of the Singhalese emperors and their product was not as well made. Thus it is rather easy to distinguish between Ceylon massu and the copies made on the mainland.

“Dean of Canadian numismatics” *final tribute*

J. Douglas Ferguson, the dean of Canadian Numismatics, has died in hospital in Cocoa Beach, Florida, after suffering a massive heart attack on December 7, 1981. He had recently celebrated his 80th birthday.

J. Douglas Ferguson was born in Bracebridge, Ontario on October 26th, 1901. He attended Humberstone Collegiate in Toronto, and then went on to study at the University of Toronto. In 1926 he married Bessie Helena Hubbell. They had one son, John. Mrs Ferguson passed away on January 14, 1979, only a few months after their fiftieth wedding anniversary.

On J. Douglas Ferguson fifth birthday his grandfather gave him one of the early colonial notes of the colony of Pennsylvania. In this way was born the start of the fabulous collection that Doug Ferguson developed.

Doug Ferguson started his business career in Toronto, but after one year's experience his employer, The Bell Telephone Company, transferred him to the Province of Quebec in 1924. He remained with this company for ten years in various management and supervisory positions. In 1933 he became the General Manager of the firm of Spencer Supports (Canada) Limited, a step which entailed the Fergusons moving to Stanstead, Quebec.

In Stanstead he devoted much of his time to local affairs, serving as president of the International Chamber of Commerce, as the first president of the Rotary Club of the Boundary, and President of the International Water Company, as well as actively promoting sports for the young. He was named Chairman of the Sherbrooke District of the Canadian Manufacturers Association during the second World War, and served as chairman for the Province of Quebec of the same organization. Later he became president of the Association for all of Canada.

J. Douglas Ferguson also served as president of the Canadian Corset Manufacturers Association, and the Canadian Manufacturers Association representative on the Board of Directors of the International Chamber of Commerce of Canada. He was also a representative of Canadian industry at many conferences in the United States, Britain and Asia and was appointed to the Canadian Business and Industry Advisory committee to the OECD (Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development) as one of two vice-chairmen. He later became Chairman of this body and was the first Canadian to be appointed to the International Executive in Paris, where he succeeded in helping to make Canada one of the three countries to be permanently a member of this executive.

Being conversant with economic and business matters in Canada and abroad, Doug Ferguson was invited by prime ministers and leading cabinet ministers to Ottawa for economic consultations.

Referred to as the "Dean of Canadian numismatics", Doug Ferguson served as president of (the only Canadian to ever hold this office) the American Numismatic Association from 1941 to 1943, was the first recipient of the Association's Order of Merit, and also received the prestigious Farran Zerbe Award. He was the first Canadian to be elected as a member of the Royal Numismatic Society in 1945 and was a Fellow or an Honorary Member of many leading numismatic societies throughout the world. He was the honorary president of the Canadian Numismatic Association, a title which was bestowed upon him soon after the Association was formed, and he had also been the Honorary president of the Canadian Paper Money Society since it was founded.

In 1969 he established an award within the Canadian Association, the J. Douglas Ferguson Award is the highest award in Canadian numismatics.

He also lent his name to the CNA'S J Douglas Ferguson Foundation, which was formed to assist in the publication of new works dealing with Canadian numismatics, as well as numismatic research and education.

In recent years, with most of his collection distributed to various museums and foundations, he concentrated on collecting Canadian wooden nickels, trade dollars and transportation tokens.

He was the the guest speaker at the Ontario Numismatic Association's 17th Annual Convention in Hamilton, Ontario, June, 1979.

Funeral services were scheduled for his home town of Rock Island, Quebec, on Saturday, December 12, 1981.

Dealer has 'trade woods'

The Vancouver Coin and Stamp Company is adopting the old "Canadian Tire" approach to its marketing.

The B.C. dealership is offering trade vouchers in numerous denominations to its customers which will be good on future purchases.

The company, however, will be using wooden money rather than the famous paper bills used by Canadian Tire.

At present, the company has printed 25 cent, 50 cent and 75 cent trade tokens, which will be given out, one per pur-

chase, according to the value of the item bought by a customer.

Eventually, says John Hnatiuk, of Vancouver Coin and Stamp, the firm will offer wooden tokens in values of \$1.00, \$2.00 and \$5.00, making them some of the highest valued tokens ever offered.

The woods will be offered to customer who buy in the store as well as to mail order customers, or anyone interested in picking a few up for their collections.

CLASSIFICATIONS ON DISPLAY CATEGORIES
 ONTARIO NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION'S
 20th; ANNIVERSARY CONVENTION
 TORONTO, ONTARIO, MARCH 12-14, 1982

1. JUNIOR... All displays entered by persons under 18 years of age. A contest by themselves apart from all other categories.
2. CANADIAN.. Includes all Provincial and Canadian Coins.
(Includes New Foundland)
3. U.S.A. ... Includes all U.S.A Coinage.
4. BRITISH EMPIRE and COMMONWEALTH... Includes all Coinage of British Colonies, Dominions and Great Britain. (EXCEPT CANADA)
5. FOREIGN.. From any one country excluding categories 2,3 and 4.
6. PAPER.. Includes all paper money, documents and other forms of exchange, etc; from any one country or from various countries, including Canada and U.S.A
7. MEDALS... Includes all War Decoration Medals.
8. MISCELLANEOUS... Includes all othe numismatic items and novelty exhibits not applicable in any of the above categories. This includes any one display showing metal items from more than one country (other than defined in #5 and #11, and any one display showing both metal and paper items together, seals and stamps not included.)
9. ERRORS... Errors occuring in the official production of Numismatic material.
10. TOKENS...Including tokens from U.S.A., CANADA, FOREIGN and BRITISH EMPIRE & COLONIES.
11. WOODEN MONEY... All wooden money from Canada, U.S.A and Foreign.
12. O.N.A. CLUB DISPLAY... Includes all above categories, O.N.A Club Members in good standing 6 months prior to show date, (October 1981) only can participate in this category. Material must be from Club Archives, Library or material loaned to the O.N.A Club.
13. NON-COMPETITION EXHIBITS... Open to all Collectors, Banks Dealers and Manufacturing. No award is given in this category.

14. BEST of SHOW... All categories listed above excluding #13 will constitute one category to ascertain the indentivity of the highest point scoring display in the entire exhibition.

Awards and Ribbons will be awarded according with the O.N.A. Display Rules and the O.N.A Judging Point System.

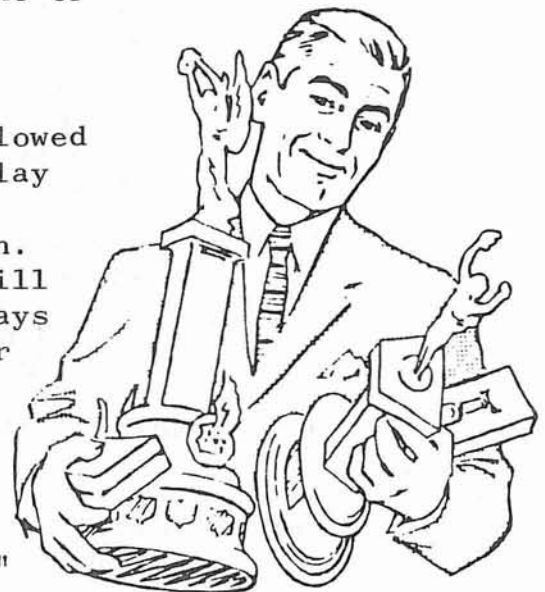
The "CHAS. B. LAISTER TROPHY" donated to the Ontario Numismatic Association for the Annual Competition of O.N.A. Club Member Displays.

This trohy will be up for competition at the 20th; Anniversary Convention at the Loews Westbury Hotel, Toronto, Ontario, March 12-14, 1982.

The trophy will be awarded for the best display from any O.N.A. Member Club in Ontario that is in good standing at Convention time. The display can be put in as a club project, or by a member of an Ontario Club but only in the name of the Club he or she is a member of.

Only one display will be allowed from each member club. The space or area allowed will be that of one, two or three display cases. The catagory will be of any catagory that the club wish to enter in. But all displays in this competition will be competitive and none of these displays will be allowed to compete in any other O.N.A. categories.

The "W.E. "PAT" LAMBERT MEMORIAL TROPHY" will be awarded to the best Junior Exhibit. This trophy is donated by the Ontario Numismatic Association in memory of the late "W.E. "Pat" Lambert" who was the O.N.A. President for the term of 1973 - 1975.

EXHIBIT RULES

1. Security will be provided during the three day convention.
2. Competition for exhibitors is opened to all members of the Ontario Numismatic Association or any Recognized Coin Club.
3. Display material must be the property of the person displaying same.
4. The name or identity of any exhibitor in competition shall not appear on the exhibit unless the exhibit is entered as NON-COMPETITIVE or CLUB DISPLAY.
5. Exhibitors are asked not to attend their exhibits while the displays are being judge. (Exhibitors can be disqualified if he or she does not abide with this rule.)
6. All matters relating to the display at this convention shall be determined by the Exhibit Chairman.
7. Exhibitors are responsible for setting up display and removing same.
8. Exhibitors must not remove his or her display without the permission of the Exhibit Chairman.
9. The Judges will submit final point scores for all competitive displays to the Exhibit Chairman at the close of the judging. The selection of the prize winning exhibits is the responsibility of the judges and their decision is final.
10. Cases supplied are the standard exhibit size.
11. No vertical frames or cases exhibits allowed. (except non-competitive) All cases must lie flat on exhibitors table.
12. No moving or animated displays for competition allowed.
13. No material of any kind allowed outside the case.
14. No advertising in any form will be permitted with any competitive exhibit.
15. Any material known to be a legitimate copy or replica must be labelled as such. Any material known to be forged, spurious or counterfeit cannot be displayed unless the exhibit is labelled and titled as an exhibit of forgeries and displayed non-competitively for educational purposes only.
16. Exhibits in order to qualify must be placed between 9:00 A.M. & 6:00 P.M. Friday March 12th; 1982 or between 8:30 A.M. to Noon Saturday , March 13th; 1982. The display must be left intact untill 4:00 P.M. on Sunday, March 14th; 1982.

17. Judging will take place around 2:00 P.M. on Saturday March 13th; 1982.

18. Display Awards will be presented to the winners at the Banquet on Saturday Evening, March 13th; 1982.

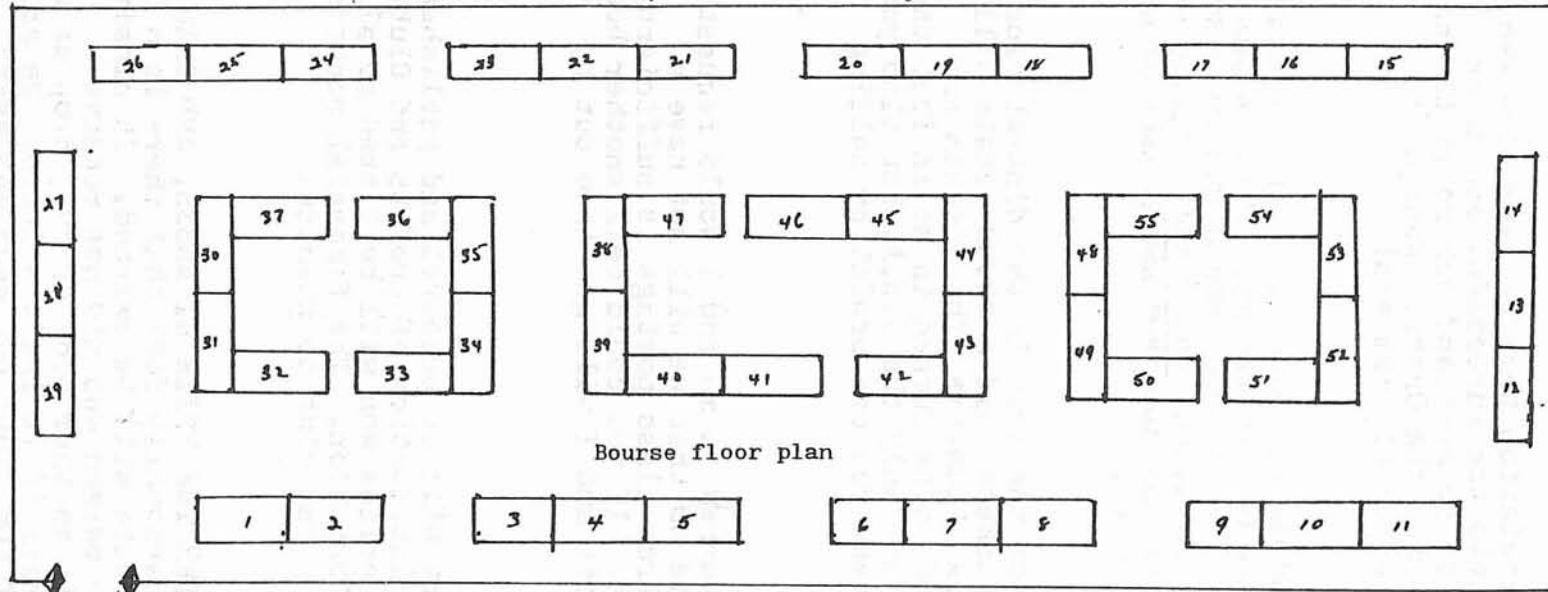

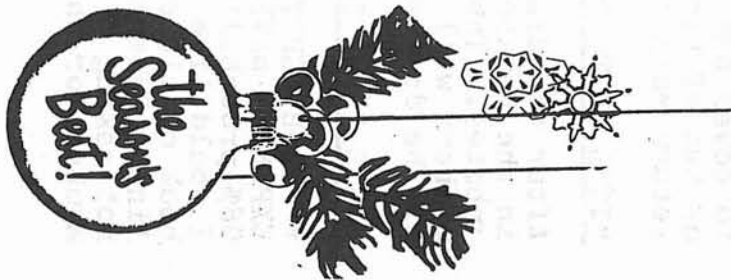
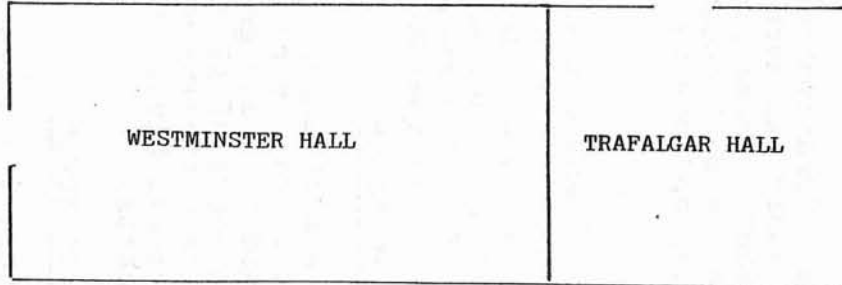
